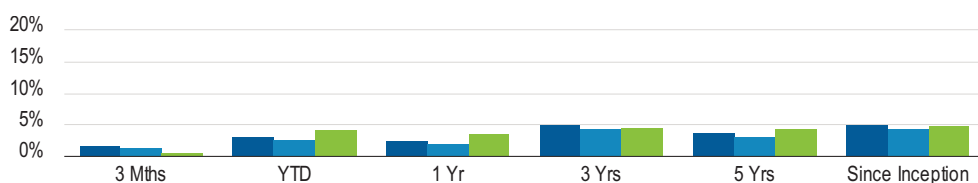

Portfolio Manager Insight

Market Review

- Global aggregate bond indices registered positive returns in US-dollar terms over the third quarter, though economic figures released over the period were mixed.
- Data released in July showed that US gross domestic product (GDP) fell at an annualised rate of over 30% in the second quarter, the most significant single-quarter contraction on record for the world's largest economy.
- Benchmark US Treasury yields were broadly flat for the quarter overall, although in August they reached their highest level since March.
- European Union (EU) leaders finally reached an agreement on the €750 billion COVID-19 rescue plan initially proposed in May.
- In August, the eurozone entered a period of deflation for the first time in four years.
- Yields on benchmark German Bunds finished the third quarter marginally down and well within negative territory.
- Corporate securities outperformed government bonds over the period. High-yield issues and emerging market (EM) bonds also enjoyed a strong quarter.

Performance Review

- Selection in Italian sovereign issues, which are likely to be key beneficiaries of the recently announced rescue package by the EU, helped relative results.
- Selection in US corporate high-yield industrial bonds also helped, although a non-benchmark allocation slightly hindered relative returns.
- Local market allocation also added to relative returns, largely owing to underweight exposures to the underperforming markets of China, Japan and the UK, and overweight positions in the eurozone, Uruguayan and Indonesian markets, which bettered the benchmark.
- Overweight duration and yield-curve positioning in eurozone bonds had a further positive effect on relative results.
- Currency positioning weighed on relative performance, held back by overweight allocations to the Indonesian rupiah, US dollar, Japanese yen and Turkish lira, all of which weakened against the Australian dollar.

Outlook & Strategy

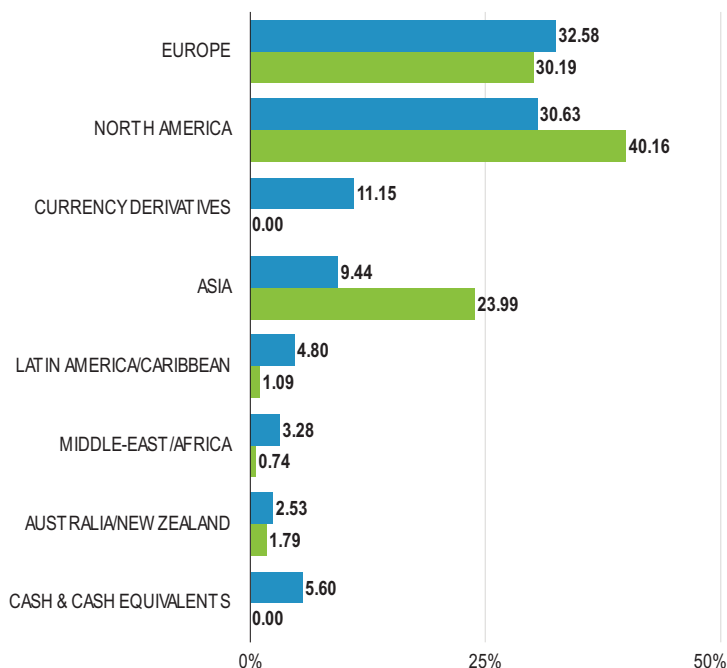
- The outlook for the US economy and financial markets is clearly highly dependent on the forthcoming US elections and resulting political landscape.
- With China/US trade tensions now a bipartisan issue, any significant softening of the US position on trade seems unlikely, regardless of the election outcome.
- We expect further fiscal stimulus to be agreed post-election but have concerns about how long the current levels of fiscal and monetary stimulus can be extended.
- In Europe, although the United Kingdom officially left the EU in January of this year, issues remain in the Brexit saga; we believe negotiations will probably continue right up until the final days of the year.
- Regardless of the outcome of the US presidential election or the Brexit negotiations, we do not foresee any fundamental changes in the dynamics for fixed income markets.
- Given that central banks have flooded the world with liquidity, we do not believe a change in US presidents will be enough to precipitate a significant rise in yields.

Portfolio Diversification⁵Geographic Allocation vs. Bloomberg Barclays Global Aggregate (Hedged into AUD) Index⁸

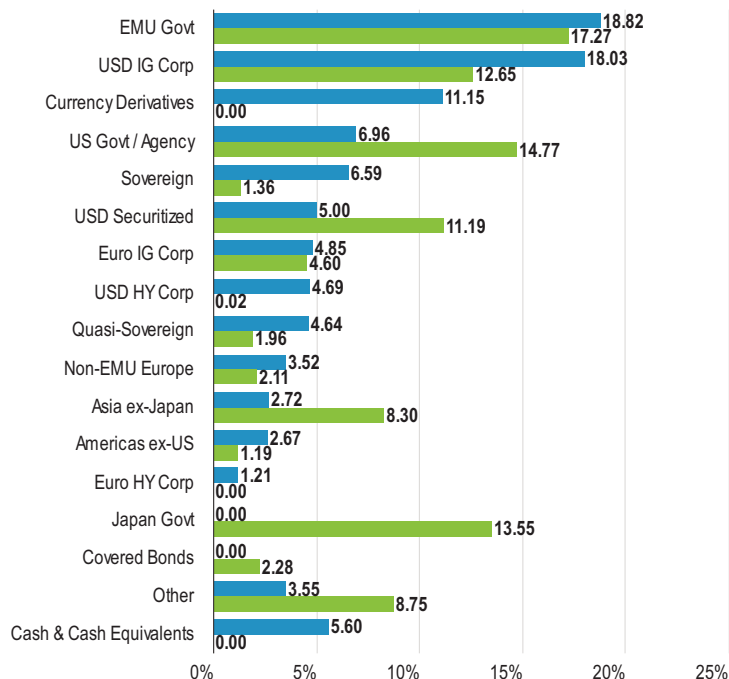
Market Value—Percent of Total

Market Value—Percent of Total



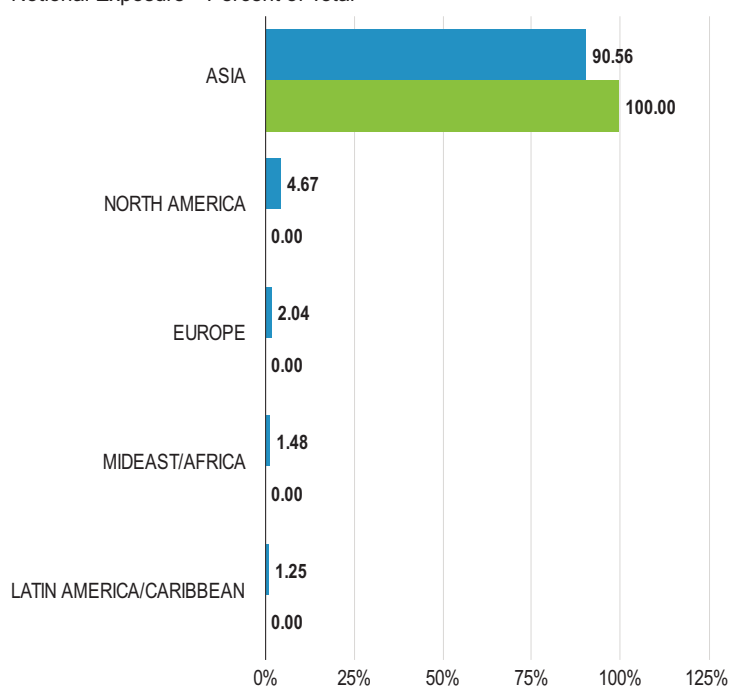

7. The average credit quality (ACQ) rating may change over time. The portfolio itself has not been rated by an independent rating agency. The letter rating, which may be based on bond ratings from different agencies (or internal ratings for unrated bonds, cash and equivalents), is provided to indicate the average credit rating of the portfolio's underlying investments and generally ranges from AAA (highest) to D (lowest). For unrated bonds, cash and equivalents, ratings may be assigned based on the ratings of the issuer, the ratings of the underlying holdings of a pooled investment vehicle, or other relevant factors. The ACQ is determined by assigning a sequential integer to all credit ratings AAA to D, taking a simple, asset-weighted average of investments by market value and rounding to the nearest rating. The risk of default increases as a bond's rating decreases, so the ACQ provided is not a statistical measurement of the portfolio's default risk because a simple, weighted average does not measure the increasing level of risk from lower-rated bonds. The ACQ may be lower if cash and equivalents are excluded from the calculation. The ACQ is provided for informational purposes only. Derivative positions are not reflected in the ACQ.

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Currency Exposure vs. Bloomberg Barclays Global Aggregate (Hedged into AUD) Index⁹

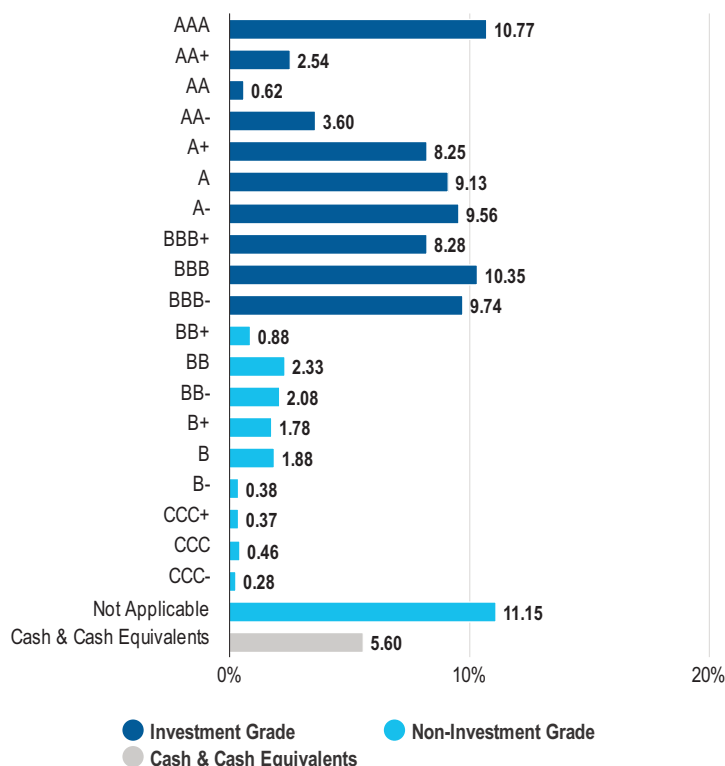
Notional Exposure—Percent of Total

Market Value—Percent of Total



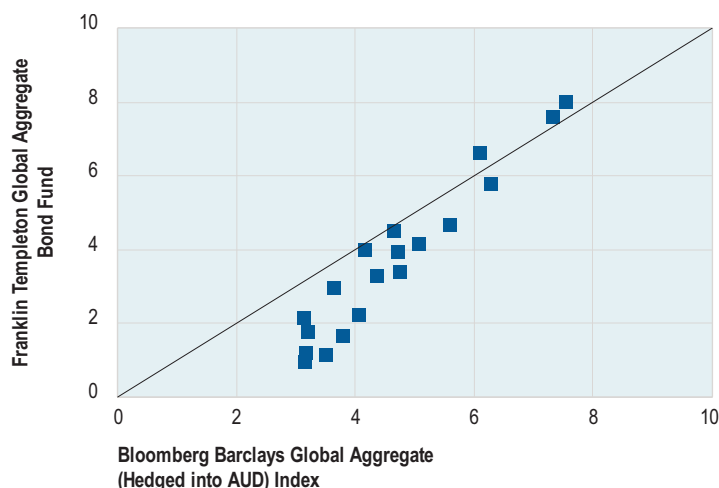

Investment Philosophy

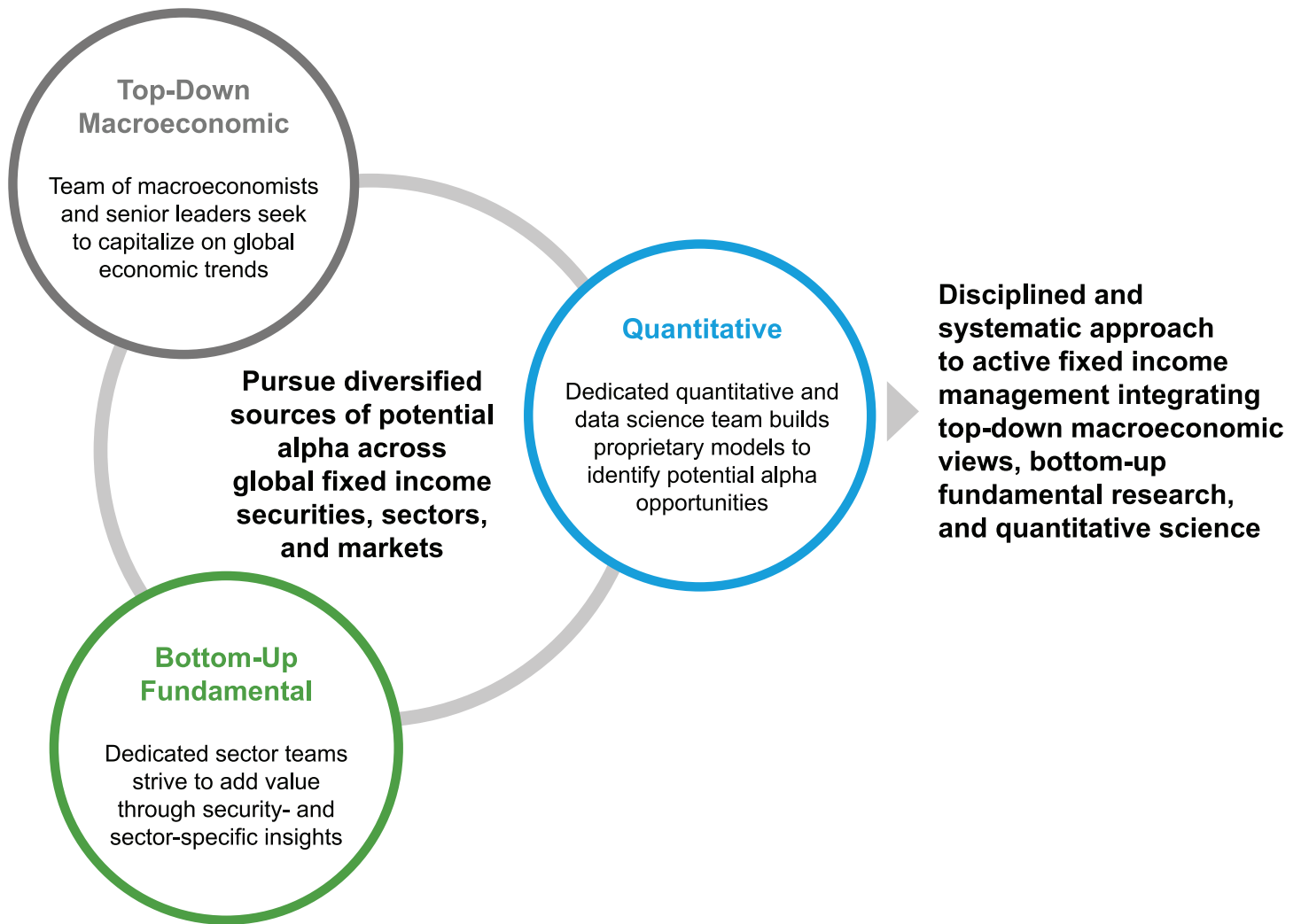
Franklin Templeton Fixed Income believes that integrating top-down macroeconomic views, bottom up fundamental research, and quantitative science provides us with a competitive edge to navigate challenging investment environments, pursue consistent alpha, and better serve our clients.

11. Ratings shown are assigned by one or more Nationally Recognized Statistical Rating Organizations ('NRSRO'), such as Standard & Poor's, Moody's and Fitch. 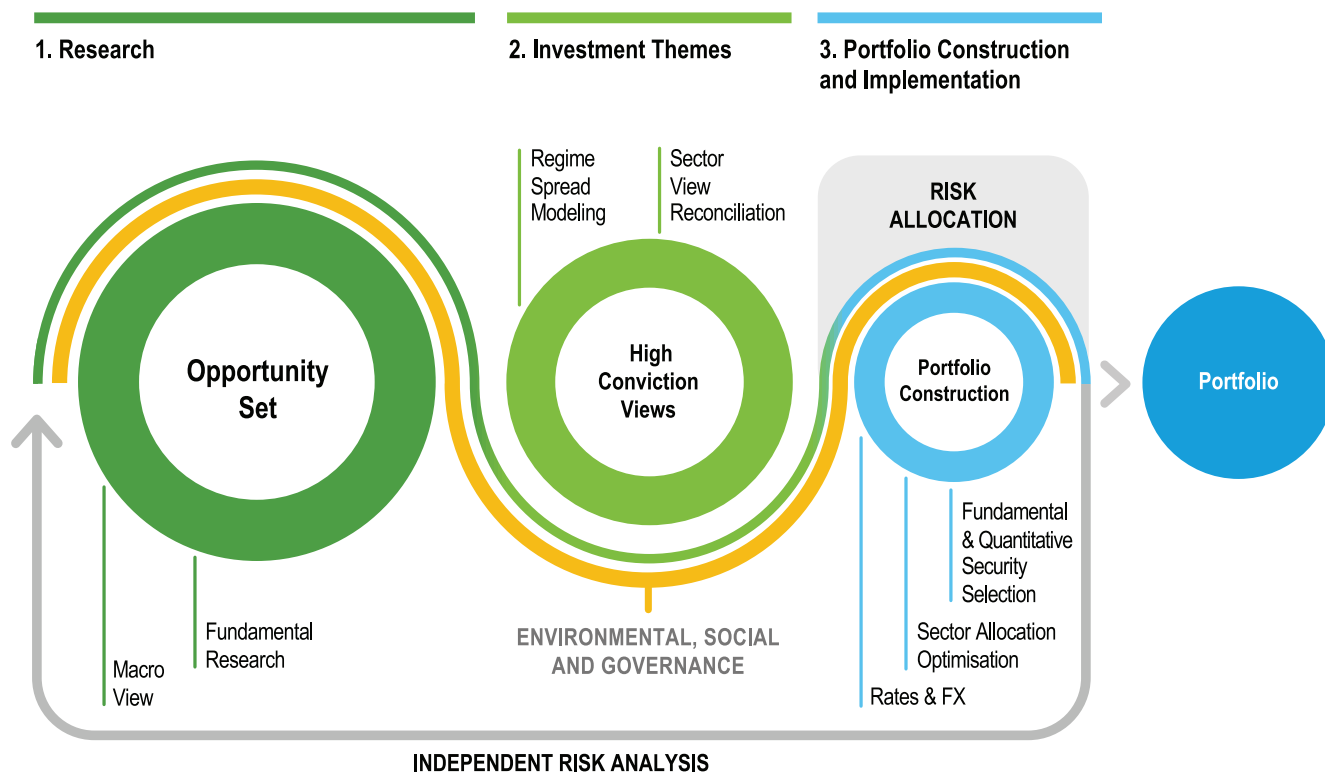
13. Information Ratio is a way to evaluate a manager's ability to outperform a benchmark in relation to the risk that manager is assuming, with risk defined as deviation from the benchmark. This measure is calculated by dividing the portfolio's excess return (portfolio return less the benchmark return) by the tracking error (derived by taking the standard deviation of the monthly differences between the portfolio return and the benchmark return over time).

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Investment Process

Our investment process marries independently derived macroeconomic and fundamental sector-specific research with quantitative insights.



Research

The Quarterly Research and Strategy Forum is the starting point for our investment process. At this forum the Fixed Income Strategy & Research Team (FIRST), which includes all Franklin Templeton fixed income investment professionals and representatives from other Franklin Templeton investment teams, present and debate independently derived macro, fundamental, and quantitative research. The purpose is to establish key investment themes for the next six to 12 months.

Individual sector teams dedicated to global sovereigns/quasi sovereigns, corporate credit and securitised debt, are responsible for preparing and presenting independent research which culminates in a fundamentals-driven outlook and recommendation for their sectors.

Investment Themes

Our proprietary model provides unbiased forecast of spreads in each sector. Applying economic forecasts and machine learning, the model maps this forecast to an historic economic regime /environment considering how spreads in different sectors have behaved.

We perform a reconciliation between the macro views, quantitative input, fundamental views, and cross sector considerations to arrive at high conviction spread forecasts across all sectors.

Comparing expected spreads with prevailing market spreads identifies which sectors look expensive relative to our forecast 'fair value' and which sectors look cheap.

The goal of this process is to provide the investment team with a high conviction view of expected spreads, to aid in the portfolio optimising process.

Portfolio Construction and Implementation

We use a sophisticated portfolio optimisation to maximise expected excess return for a given level of risk. Sector allocation, coupled with our top-down macro views, drive the final allocations for each strategy.

We conduct a 'neighbourhood analysis' to determine optimal allocation bands. This process seeks to ensure that risk is efficiently allocated to our highest conviction views in a way that is consistent, repeatable, and designed for accountability.

Each sector allocation is then populated with the highest conviction securities of each sector team. This process brings together factor-based quantitative security rankings and active fundamental credit recommendations into prioritised, potential buy and sell lists at the security level.

Material environmental, social, and governance (ESG) issues are an integral component of our bottom-up research and risk/return forecasts. Analysts have access to multiple ESG data sources to help build a qualitative view of each issuer and security.

Risk Management

Throughout the portfolio construction process, portfolio managers collaborate with our independent Investment Risk Management Group, using a mosaic of risk metrics, to monitor and evaluate the level and sources of risk in each portfolio, and to ensure the allocation of risk is commensurate with the forward-looking views of the investment team, level of conviction, and the portfolio's investment objectives and guidelines.

Franklin Templeton Global Aggregate Bond Fund seeks to achieve above average total return by investing primarily in global bonds that can be described as from "core" sectors: global government bonds, mortgage-backed securities, agencies and global corporate bonds. The remaining securities may be invested in "non-core" sectors: emerging market debt, global high yield bonds and global inflation-linked securities (including Treasury Inflation Protected Securities or "TIPS"). The strategy regularly uses currency forwards, options, interest rate futures and other derivatives such as swaps (including credit default swaps and total return swaps) for hedging purposes or for investment to control risk or assume tactical exposure to various foreign currencies or asset classes consistent with the investment objective. The strategy purchases TBA (To Be Announced) mortgage-backed securities and engages regularly in mortgage dollar rolls. In addition, the firm regularly uses foreign currency forward contracts in conjunction with the normal settlement of security trades in currencies other than the base currency of each account.

Total returns are presented in Australian dollars both gross and net of investment advisory fees, are inclusive of commissions and transaction costs, and assume reinvestment of any dividends, interest income, capital gains, or other earnings.
